So peer mated were given guidance by the subject teachers. After the result of house examination, a number of students were found in the need of the special guidance in particular subjects. So the necessity of the practice exercises with remedial teaching and routine assessment was felt. The Practice The college conducts the remedial teaching for college students to develop specific skill among the students that may contribute to enhance their academic performances. Special attention is paid to the students those are unable to understand the curriculum in regular lectures and show poor performance in unit tests held in the month of January, 2016 and house examinations held in the month of April, 2016. Faculty members of respective subjects mentored the students in house meetings also and interpret</p>

the aspects of the curriculum. They continuously promote students to express their thoughts at each level. For this practice, the subject teachers also take help of the student teachers who excel in particular subjects to assist the peer mates with poor performances in the same subjects. Peer support assist the student teachers in fostering positive inter personal relationships also. Evidence of Success The practice of remedial teaching was found successful. The aim of this practice was to improve the academic performance of the students in University exams who were not doing well in unit or house exams at college level. There was improvement in their marks in the re-examination conducted at college level. Their performance was improved remarkably due to individual attention. Problems Encountered This best practice was started in 2015-16 due to introduction of Two year B.Ed. Programme in this session. But the basic problem found was the scarcity of time due to number of theory and practical papers in the Time-Table of B.Ed. Course. The college is only for Women College, so numbers of female students are coming from distant places and use the bus service to reach the college. There is problem of extra stay of the student teachers in the college due to Bus time schedule of the distant students. So the subject teachers has to use the time of morning assembly and lunch break for this practice and peer teaching is encouraged to achieve the aim of the practice.
